<u>French 11 Burnaby Online</u> Course Overview for Students and Parents

Bienvenue à la classe de Français 11! Students who complete French 11 will earn course credit that will allow them to transition to senior level French courses. This course represents a bridge year between junior and senior grades and is designed to help students continue to advance their level of French language proficiency. Students will leave French 11 with a solid mastery of proficient to advanced level French language skills particularly in writing and listening. Students will be able to communicate in a variety of situations. In order to become proficient in a language, students will communicate in that target language as much as possible.

Students this year will use a comprehensive program that will be further supplemented by other relevant resources. We will begin with a general review of basic concepts from grade 10 as we move through the study of the prescribed curriculum using the <u>D'Accord 2</u> program. This program offers an integrative approach based on communicative objectives, linguistic components, along with cultural and educational activities.

Core Competencies

Teaching and learning in this course will focus on the 6 major Core Competencies as per district and provincial curriculum guidelines. These 6 Core Competencies are:

Communication: How students exchange information, experiences and ideas.

Creative Thinking: How students generate new ideas and take them from thought to reality. **Critical Thinking**: How students make judgements based on reasoning and available information.

Positive Personal & Cultural Identity: How students create healthy personal and cultural awareness in a pluralistic society.

Personal Awareness & Responsibility: How students develop awareness of skills and strategies to stay healthy both physically and mentally.

Social Responsibility: How students contribute positively to their families, community, society, and the environment.

Big Ideas

French 11 explores the following Big Ideas:

- Listening and viewing with intent supports our acquisition of French.
- The communicative context determines how we express ourselves.
- Language and culture are interconnected and shape our perspective, identity, and voice.

- Exploring diverse forms of cultural expression promotes greater understanding of our own cultural identity.
- Acquiring French provides a unique opportunity to access and interact with the Francophone world.
- Developing proficiency in French provides diverse opportunities.

• Identify and explore personal, educational, and professional opportunities requiring proficiency in French

Upon completion of French 11, students are expected to know the following:

· commonly used vocabulary and sentence structures for communication in past, present,

and future time frames:

- questions
- sequences of events
- predictions
- personal experiences
- opinions
- comparisons and contrasts
- elements of a variety of types of texts
- register and language etiquette
- idiomatic expressions from across la francophonie
- ethics of cultural appropriation and plagiarism

- Unité 4 (Unit 6): En ville
