
Course Plan



Curriculum Goals

The Career Education curriculum supports students in the process of becoming successful, educated citizens by providing them with opportunities to explore a variety of careers and options for their future. Career Education helps students to discover a bridge between classroom learning and workplace and post-secondary realities, and is intended to make their learning meaningful and relevant.

The Career Education curriculum contributes to students' development as educated citizens through the achievement of the following goals. Students are expected to:


- develop awareness of their individual skills, interests, values, and passions, and connect them to career goals
- work and communicate effectively with others, valuing diversity of people and cultures, ideas, and opportunities
- understand the role of learning in supporting their career goals and be prepared to continue learning and developing new interests, knowledge, and skills throughout their lives
- recognize the need to be adaptable, resilient, and flexible in order to meet the changing demands of the work environment
- · recognize the necessity of safety standards in the workplace
- understand the value and importance of career development to individual lives, communities, society, and the global economy
- identify and research education and career pathways, and explore a range of career experiences, including volunteering and non-traditional approaches to work
- effectively use goal-setting and decision-making strategies to develop, manage, and adjust their educational and career plans

Big Ideas

The Big Ideas consist of generalizations and principles and the key concepts important in this area of learning. The Big Ideas represent what students will understand at the completion of the course.

Career Life Education is based on these five Big Ideas:






Learning Standards

Course Description

Career Life Education will help you to become more prepared for life after high school. You will learn important skills such as budgeting and making smart purchases. You will gain an understanding of personal networks and how your online profile can impact you in the real world. Finally, you will explore career options and start working on your post-graduation plan.

A post-graduation plan is personal - it is something that reflects your interests, values and beliefs. Your post-graduation plan will involve possible career paths, post-secondary education plans, financial planning, and health & wellness goals.

Career Life Education is a 4-credit course and is required for graduation. Career Life Education, Career Life Connections, and the Capstone project are designed to replace the previous graduation requirements of Planning 10 and the Grad Transitions portfolio.

- 2. MY CONNECTIONS explore your personal network and reflect on your connections to community
- 3. EMPLOYABILITY explore career skills and responsibilities
- 4. WORK SAFETY- develop work safety awareness
- 5. FUTURE PLANNING explore career options and plan for your future
- 6. FINAL ACTIVITIES a culmination of your learning in this course
