Course Description

Intro Spanish 11 is a course that is designed for students who did not start Spanish in Grade 9 and offers and accelerated and intensive curriculum covering the content from Spanish 9 and Spanish 10 in one course. Once this course is completed, students are ready to take Spanish 11. This course is designed for students with little prior knowledge of Spanish and starts with basic concepts and advances at a quick pace.

Big Ideas

Intro Spanish 11 explores the following Big Ideas:

- Listening and viewing with intent supports our acquisition and understanding of a new language
- Stories help us to acquire language and understand the world around us
- Expressing ourselves in a new language requires courage, risk taking, and perseverance.
- Exploring diverse forms of cultural expression allows us to experience and appreciate cultural diversity.
- Acquiring a new language provides a unique opportunity to access and interact with diverse communities.

- Unit 2: In the Classroom, gender and number of words, definite and indefinite articles, hay

- Unit 3: Family, possessive adjectives, tener, ser, subject pronouns, numbers 30-1000
- Unit 4: Adjectives, ser and estar, interrogatives, time.
- Unit 5: Clothing, Colours, Demonstrative Adjectives, Ir, AR Verbs
- Unit 6: Weather, Calendar, Seasons, ER/IR Verbs
- Unit 7: Food and Drinks, To like/love, Indirect Object Pronouns, Preferences
- Unit 8: Diet and Nutrition, Comparisons of Superiority, Inferiority and Equality, Superlatives
- Unit 9: Sports and Past Times, Irregular Present tense verbs, Positive/Negative words
- Unit 10: Parts of the body, Stem-Changing verbs, Doler
- Unit 11: Daily Routines, Reflexive Verbs, Irregular Verbs
- Unit 12: In the house, Prepositions and contractions, Chores, Obligations
- Unit 13: In your city, Estar and prepositional phrases, Direct Object Pronouns
- Unit 14: Transportation, Informal Commands, Formal Commands, Commands with Direct Object Pronouns, Preterite tense
- Unit 15: Feelings and Emotions, Tener expressions, Ponerse, Preterite Irregulars
- Unit 16: Careers, Saber and Conocer, Preterite AR
- Unit 17: Nature, Geography, Vacations, Indirect Object Pronouns, Preterite of ER/IR verbs
